## **Treasurer's Report**

The Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Summary and Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June 2010 are presented with this report for your consideration.

The Group recorded a surplus for the year of \$7,928 compared to \$20,276 the previous year. The difference is due mainly to extra funding provided to the Jamboree, some unpaid rent and an increase in program and equipment costs. A grant of \$4,863 is approved but yet to be received under the 2009 Volunteer Grants Program.

The fundraising has concentrated on some key events such as the Christmas Carols and Teddy Bears Picnic in a bid to increase return for effort. Hall rents have increased slightly over the financial year and we expect larger returns next year.

I take this opportunity to thank Lyn Harrison for help taking over the Treasurer role, Peter Chilton and Jenny Bush for their assistance during the year and James Scott for his help with Audit.

I thank all members for their prompt payment of subs this year and the assistance of Peter Chilton in achieving this.

The year has been an enjoyable one with increased numbers of scouts and some great programs. I look forward to the year ahead especially with the upcoming Cuboree.

### **12<sup>th</sup> Caulfield Scout Section: Annual Report 2009/10**

2009/10 has been another very successful year for the 12<sup>th</sup> Caulfield Scout Section, which presently has 30 invested Scouts and 4 linking cubs, all of whom are actively pursuing their Scouting life. 10 of these are girls, 24 are boys, and all are wonderful! At present we have had to stop accepting new joining Scouts as we do not have enough leaders to run a quality program for larger numbers than this. Cubs are of course guaranteed a place in Scouts.

The year's highlight and the culmination of a lot of preparation was having 19 Scouts and 2 Leaders attend the triennial 12-day AJ2010 Jamboree at Cataract Park, south of Sydney. Many Scouts found that they were capable of things that they did not know they could do, and all had a unique and memorable life experience and a great deal of fun!

Other activities have included:

- ✓ 8 other one-to-four night camps at Clifford Park, Gilwell, Mt Martha and Bell Park Scout Camps. These had a wide variety of themes (bushcraft, abseiling, hiking, patrol activities, water skiing etc)
- ✓ Several Pioneer Journeys, a 2-day Explorer Hike and a 3-day 40km Adventurer Hike
- ✓ Visiting interesting places included Yarra Bend, French Island, and the Great Ocean Walk
- ✓ 40 different Thursday Scout night activities, including some hugely popular new activities ("Drive & Dump", "Iceblocking", "Masterchef" etc)
- ✓ Attendance by 8 senior Scouts at Level I First Aid Training and achievement of this Certificate (and their Adventurer level First Aid badge)
- ✓ Visits to the Moorabbin Police Station, Moorabbin Bowl, MSAC, Waves, a wildlife shelter, Moorabbin airport (and went for a fly), Hard Rock climbing gym, Como Park, and all over Melbourne in The Fantastic Race
- ✓ Convincingly winning the 2010 Glen Eira Stonnington District Swimming Carnival in late July

Competency progress as measured by badgework continues at all levels. We had three Scouts (now all Venturers) who were awarded The Australian Scout Medallion - the highest award in the Scout Section: Chloe Love, Rosie Marshall and Bec Parish. Approximately 1% of Scouts achieve this award. There are several more with a good chance of completing this later in 2010, and many promising younger ones on the way through.

On the equipment front Chris Love designed the best Patrol Boxes we've ever seen, and arranged for four of these to be constructed by the Beaumaris Mens' Shed, for which we are very grateful! They were successfully used for the first time at the 5 day Galaxy Theme Camp.

The Scouting system encourages the older Scouts to take increasing roles in not only assisting and training the younger ones, but also in the management of the Troop and running activities. 12<sup>th</sup> Caulfield has continued to carefully follow the Scouting 'Patrol System' to move our youth through to leadership and responsibility in a controlled and planned manner.

On the Scout Leader front we have welcomed Guy Delon into our ranks; Guy is moving through Basic Training. We sadly farewelled Amy Tang who moved to Sydney in March 2010. Both Bob and Lesley are working towards completion of Advanced Scout Section training in late 2010.

We do have a clear need for additional Scout Leaders, and note that it has been many years since any 12<sup>th</sup> Caulfield Scout Leaders have been parents of 12<sup>th</sup> Caulfield youth - a missed opportunity to interact with children at a short, critical, and fun time of their growing up!
